Thank You

High inflation, the rising cost of living, and high interest rates and energy bills are putting ZANE's fundraising efforts under severe pressure. News headlines are understandably focused on the terrible wars in Ukraine and the Middle East, while the ongoing plight of Zimbabwe's poorest is of little media interest.

These factors have a direct impact on fundraising income. However, thanks to the loyalty of ZANE's supporters, we are still managing to provide lifesaving aid to over 2,000 destitute pensioners, including some 500 war veterans and their widows. ZANE's clubfoot correction programme is transforming the lives of children – over 5,400 children have been treated to date across Zimbabwe. And in a high-density suburb, our education projects continue to impact the lives of children who otherwise would not be receiving any schooling.

The predictable result of the Zimbabwe election in August gave rise to an atmosphere of defeat and despondency. ZANE beneficiaries face another five years without adequate healthcare or social services. Life

in Zimbabwe is a constant battle for survival; there is little scope to focus on anything other than simply getting through each day.

It is ZANE's kind and generous supporters that enable survival. Your donations provide food, shelter and medicine to those who rely on aid to survive each day. Life for those assisted by ZANE would be so much worse without your support. Please be assured it is never taken for granted and please know it really does save lives.

Case Study

Rising Star

Roger*, 78, was a talented sportsman. He excelled at rugby and cricket, playing at a high level for his school and university. After gaining a degree in Economics in South Africa, Roger returned to Zimbabwe where he established a banking career. Coaching sport and refereeing matches in his spare time, he became well-known and respected in his fields.

In the late 1960s, Roger enlisted with the army, rising to the rank of lieutenant. Sadly, he was badly injured when a hand grenade he was holding exploded, leaving him with



brain damage. After years of rehabilitation, Roger was able to walk again but the entire left side of his body was damaged. He was left with permanent short-term memory loss.


With assistance, Roger was able to work in supported admin roles in a building society for many years until his health deteriorated further. With no income and just a tiny army pension, Roger found himself destitute and homeless. ZANE intervened and Roger now lives in a retirement home where he receives three meals a day and the medical assistance he requires.

Without the kindness of ZANE supporters, Roger's life would be very different. "I'm very happy where I live. I am looked after and can watch sport in the communal room with my friends. Thank you. Without your support, I would be penniless."

Bright Futures

The ZANE-funded education programme is flourishing, despite operating in a community experiencing extreme poverty, turmoil and uncertainty. Children attending the pop-up classes continue to thrive in their learning and benefit from the safe and nurturing space the classes provide. In addition to 72 children in six classes, ZANE works with 14 parents assisting with community gardens crucial to contributing to the food provided at the classes, and in encouraging selfsufficiency.

ZANE is funding 28 scholarships for children attending mainstream schools in the same community the majority of whom have progressed from the pop-up classes. In addition, ZANE is providing a scholarship for a gifted A level student. Simba, 18, did not attend school during the covid-enforced lockdowns and his family could not afford online tuition. Despite this, he achieved nine A grades in his GCSEs. With his family unable to fund his further education, ZANE provided a scholarship and Simba is predicted three A grades at

Walking Wonders

ZANE founders Tom and Jane Benvon have completed 14 sponsored walks to raise funds for Zimbabwe's destitute pensioners. The first walk, back in 2010, took them from Edinburgh to London. Since then, they have covered much of the UK, most recently walking along the North Norfolk coast. As many ZANE supporters know, Tom and Jane write a blog to accompany the walks -Tom's is a social and political commentary while Jane's is a description of their route and surroundings.

Accompanied by their canine companions, Tom and Jane have covered an incredible 3,080 miles for ZANE. The walks remain a significant fundraiser and it is for this reason that, with a combined age of 158, Tom and Jane continue to don their walking boots and embark on these impressive hikes.





They do so with great grace and humour, often accompanied by and generously hosted by ZANE supporters up and down the country.

As Tom recently wrote in his blog: "Someone asked me why the walks continue to be popular. I reckon loyal supporters assume that Jane and I must be as stiff as stoats after all these years — so they back us 'one last time'. And

then, guess what? The following year, we pop up again like a jack in the box with, 'Hello! Here we go again!' And so our supporters think, 'Gosh, one more time it is, where's the cheque book?' And the process repeats itself!"

The reality is that, as long as they are able, Tom and Jane will continue to walk for the destitute pensioners of Zimbabwe with nowhere else to turn.

They walk because it could be them – and it it could be you.

A Rescue Mission

Earlier this year, the ZANE team in Harare dealt with one of its most harrowing cases to date. Janet* has been under ZANE's care for many years, benefitting from an annual grant from one of the UK services charities. She worked as a senior aircraft operative, a job she loved. Sadly, Janet abandoned her career after she was attacked and raped on an evening out, resulting in a pregnancy and the birth of her son, Adam*.

Janet later worked as a bookkeeper but struggled to maintain jobs as Adam was a challenging child who would later be diagnosed with a learning disability and schizophrenia. Janet was able to buy a small flat where she and Adam both lived until recently. On previous visits to Janet's flat, the ZANE case worker, Lucy, could see that Janet was just about coping – although it was clear she was struggling with Adam who had stopped taking

his schizophrenia medication. The pair's living conditions were deteriorating, and Adam's behaviour was becoming increasingly challenging and threatening. Despite this, Janet was insistent that she wanted to continue to stay in the flat and care for Adam.

Over the last two years, however, Janet insisted on meeting Lucy outside the flat – she was concerned Lucy's visits would upset Adam who was often aggressive and volatile. It meant ZANE was not fully aware of how bad the situation had become.

On one such visit earlier this year, it became apparent that Janet's health was rapidly declining and her personal hygiene was poor. The team became very concerned and worried about what would happen to Adam if she died. After time and counselling, Janet agreed to move to a care home as long as ZANE sought medical help for Adam, 49.

The ZANE team quickly put a plan in place and in June this year, an ambulance crew and a psychiatrist arrived at the flat. This in itself was a mission – these things are not straightforward in Zimbabwe and it is testament to the small ZANE team involved that this could be arranged. Further, there was a significant cost incurred and the operation was only possible thanks to the generosity of ZANE supporters.

Adam was sedated and transferred to a psychiatric ward of a government hospital in Harare while Janet was taken to a care home.

Janet and Adam were living in appalling conditions, the worst the ZANE team has ever seen (see photo). Neither had bathed for a long time, their clothing was filthy and Adam's hair had grown past his shoulders. Both were suffering from malnutrition.

Adam stabilised quickly with the right medication and care. He has now moved to the same care home as Janet. Sadly, Janet has been diagnosed with breast cancer, which doctors suspect has spread to her bones. She is receiving palliative care and will spend her remaining time being looked after in comfort. She and Adam regularly have their meals together and enjoy playing bingo.

Janet is receiving an increased grant from the UK services charities to cover her care home fees and ZANE is paying for her medication and living costs.

After an industrial deep clean,

Janet's flat has sold and the proceeds will be used to cover Adam's ongoing care home fees and medical costs.

This has been a harrowing and distressing case, but one that we wanted to share with you. It highlights that ZANE is about so much more than providing financial aid. The care, compassion, initiative and tenacity of the team involved saved the lives of Janet and Adam.

Janet will live her final days with dignity – she and Adam would otherwise have died in squalor, alone and isolated.

In supporting ZANE, you enable us to resolve complex cases like this one, and to gift dignity and comfort to people in the depths of despair.

Your donations have enabled ZANE to successfully treat over 5,400 children born with clubfoot.

Left untreated, clubfoot causes disfigurement and disability. Children with untreated clubfoot in Zimbabwe face poor life chances, pain, stigma and in many cases, abuse and neglect. Yet, treated early, clubfoot can be corrected without invasive surgery. Just £240 can successfully treat a child with clubfoot, leaving them free to lead a life free of disability and to be able to jump for joy.



Food for Thought

- ZANE distributes around 16 tonnes of e'Pap each year.
 This is a nutritious, pre-cooked porridge that is a blend of maize and soya enriched with vitamins and minerals.
- ZANE provides care homes with 168,000 eggs, over 28,000 bananas and around 5,000 cabbages each year.
- A ZANE food parcel provided to destitute pensioners includes oats, cooking oil, juice, tinned fruit, baked beans, soup, tomato puree, tinned sardines, tea, coffee, powdered milk, sugar, marmalade, rice, biscuits and toilet roll.



 ZANE provides over 15,000 hot meals each year for children and teaching mentors attending the pop-up classes – for most, it is their only meal of the day. These meals are supplemented with vegetables grown by beneficiaries in community gardens.
